POLICY BRIEF: GENDERESEARCHIRELAND

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INFORMING EU POLICY

This policy brief is based on a *Key Policy Messages* document submitted to the EC Research Executive Agency (REA), in conjunction with a research presentation in the REA, Brussels, 25th June 2019. The presentation was part of the *Education and Learning* panel. The purpose of *Key Policy Messages* was to both drive EC policy directions, informed by European Union funded research.







WHAT IS GENDERESEARCHIRELAND?

GendeResearchIreland (2018-2022) is a project funded by the European Commission's (EC) Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions (MSCA) Individual Fellowship programme. It has been designed and is being delivered by Dr Monica O'Mullane, hosted by the Institute for Social Science in the 21st Century (ISS21), University College Cork. The project's research study is an exploratory inquiry into the role of the Athena SWAN Charter in embedding gender equality in higher education in Ireland.

Dr Caitríona Ní Laoire is Monica's project mentor. They worked together previously on the FP7 funded GENOVATE consortium project (2013-2017) and in ISS21 Research Cluster activities (2008-2010). The project's Advisory Group in UCC includes Professor Carol Linehan, Professor Fred Powell and Dr Allen White.

KEY POLICY MESSAGES

- In supporting and sustaining careers in research, academia and innovation, policies need to be formulated in a bottom-up and top-down holistic approach, in providing increased support for women's careers, a greater appreciation for caring responsibilities, efforts to challenge discrimination and bias, and challenging and channelling the intersectionalities.
- In implementing gender equality interventions, the formal process of intervention is influenced by the informal processes within institutions, which impacts on how actions are conceived and implemented. This is important to acknowledge in formulating policies.
- The EU may follow the trend of tying research funding eligibility to institutions working on and addressing gender inequalities, in the way Ireland has done.
- The Athena SWAN Charter is the most comprehensive gender equality intervention in the EU, and lays a concrete basis for a pan-EU gender equality accreditation scheme.
